


I was promoting this year's **Summer Reading Challenge, The Silly Squad**, which aims to keep children aged **4-11 enjoying books through the summer holidays**. It is running digitally this year due to Covid19 and I am putting the link [here](https://summerreadingchallenge.org.uk/) to the website <https://summerreadingchallenge.org.uk/> where children can sign up and log the books they have read. There are lots of fun activities to join in with as well. Please can you share with your families who have children who would wish to join. The younger children (4) can take part by enjoying shared reading with their grownups.

I am also sharing this link to the Government's [Hungry Little Minds](https://hungrylittleminds.campaign.gov.uk/) website <https://hungrylittleminds.campaign.gov.uk/> which has lots of great ideas for 0-5s and also has links to other great resources, including the BBC's **Tiny Happy People**.

NB- The government announced on Thursday 2nd July that the *Hungry Little Minds* campaign website will be zero-rated by the major UK mobile providers. This means that parents won't use up their mobile data allowance if they browse the site from their smartphone (with the exception of third party content such as videos hosted on YouTube). Some providers already have the zero rating in place (02, Sky, Virgin, EE and Tesco), while others are working to do so by July.

There will be guidance coming out soon to all parents with more detailed information about our planned return to Grampound with Creed School in September and any updates following this guide will be emailed to you before our new term begins on Monday 7th September.

In relation to attendance, we do know that:

- Currently, all children are expected to attend school as normal from September 2020 including those children who were previously shielding.
- Children who were shielding (or have a family member who was) will need to seek medical advice if they do not believe it is safe to return to school.
- Where medical advice is given that the child should be absent from school then school should provide education remotely.

With this in mind, we thought it would be prudent to give you advance notice of this information to give families plenty of time to liaise with their GP/medical teams and seek appropriate advice for your individual circumstances. If you have not already done so, please inform school as soon as possible if your child will not return full time to school in September due to medical condition so we can follow the correct procedures and ensure remote learning is in place where needed.
